

SERVICE & OPERATION HIGHLIGHTS

Design planning began for a **new 13,500 square foot library branch** in the southwest area of the city that will be part of a joint build in partnership with the Grand Erie District School Board and the City of Brantford.

A committee consisting of Library Board and staff members collaboratively created a **Strategic Plan** that will guide the Library from 2023 to 2027.


An Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Accessibility (IDEA) committee was formed and a **multi-year IDEA workplan** was created.

A **YouTube video ad series** highlighting how people can use the Library everyday had more than 130,000 impressions.


The Library began lending a **virtual reality headset**, more **Ukrainian and Spanish children's books** and a **C-Pen**, which reads scanned text out loud.

The Library received a **Healthy Communities Initiative grant** to purchase five new WiFi hotspots and five laptops that will be lent to the public.

New subject headings and labels were created for Indigenous materials following a diversity audit.

SERVICE & OPERATION HIGHLIGHTS NEW CHILDREN'S AREA

A refreshed children's area was unveiled at the Main Branch in 2022.

A project that began prior COVID-19, the refreshed children's area was officially unveiled at a March 2022 ceremony that was attended by local dignitaries and guests.

The project involved installing new carpeting and shelving in the 10,000 square foot space. The area was also painted and several play-based learning toys were added to the space.

Notably, two large murals were included as part of the project, which were funded in-part through the city's Public Art fund.
